- These are open collections and any one can establish access to these collections by using simple hyper linking web technology.
- If you are a SSOL products subscribers, check with them before you embark on this project, for it may mean extra cost. Their charges are based on the number of journals/collections they track for you.

What Can I Learn From You?

- Have you systematically set up access to Open access collections?
- How many?
- Would you be willing to share them with me so I can share with all?
- What is your experience: patrons, librarians, systems office?

How Did It All Start For Me?

- Alerted by a discussion on the SSOL Listserve.
- Searched for such open access collections and created a list.
- Consulted with library faculty and systems department.
- Activated open access collections.
- Tested each and every collection.
- Noted down observations and shared them with library faculty and external community.

What Can You Do?

- Discuss with your library faculty and systems department about the possibilities.
- List these collections at your web site under "Special Collections", "E-journal Portal", "Subject Guides" or from the "E-Database" pages and link them appropriately.
- If you subscribe to SSOL products, contact them and check about the cost issues. You can request them to activate these collections for you.
- Marc record issues.

What Did I Learn In This Process?

Access and Technical Issues

- Decision on establishing the presence from library's web site or through the e-journal portal.
- IP ranges and proxy set up:
 - o not required as they are free for all
 - SSOL: check "Omit proxy from this database button" box
- MARC records: may or may not be available.
- Recommended browsers, operating system, java scripts, cookies, adobe versions etc.

License Agreements and Copyright

- Some collections require you to sign an agreement of usage terms before you can access full text.
- Registrations and "sign on" to create user accounts to access extra free features.
- Image signatures.
- Some web site display copy right related information: copyright of online-only journals remains with the author, other journals remain with the publishers, and restrictions are same as for print journals.

Collection Peculiarities: A Mix Bag...1

- Much more than just full text journals.
- Mix of free and priced collections, older (not offered any more) and new journal collections.
- Collection of journals from various countries.
- Current.
- Historical collecting covering just a specific period. (18th or 19th century).
- Digital Library Projects/Archives: documents and journals in full text.

Collection Peculiarities: A Mix Bag...2

- Open access institutional repositories:
 - working papers
 - o conference papers
 - reports and journal articles
- You can submit your articles and suggestions too.
- Based on open source applications like DSpace.
- Wiki based collections.

Status of Full Text

- Full text errors and missing content issues: Broken links are not very common but they are there. Lesson: there may not be a 100% full text availability.
- Constant change in the status of full text availability.
- Certain numbers of years in free and rest of them in subscription mode.
- Embargo or simply behind schedule.
- Citation with hyperlinks to external full text.
- Hyperlinks for permanent archives of full text.

- E-mail notifications for:
 - My favorite journals accounts
 - New additions
 - New launches
 - Additions of significant back file holdings
 - Change policies for free access
 - Format conversion to subscribed version
 - Availability of usage data

- RSS Feeds.
- Discussions.
- Users forums.
- Blogs.
- Collection statistics.
- Press rooms.
- Annual reports.
- Author instructions for manuscript submissions.
- Citation help.

Useful Features...3

- Bibliographies of related books and journals.
- Online courses.
- What is New, Galleries, Feedback Options, Upcoming Events, and Link to Working Groups.
- Membership options.
- Follow us on Face Book and Twitter options.
- Newsletter archives.
- Links to People & Organizations.

Useful Features...4

- Book series, Supplemental material, and Papers in press.
- Local knowledge and links.
- User counters.
- Required plug-in.
- Credits & Compliances.
- Donation options.
- New tools and technologies.
- Links to international networks.
- Job openings.

Useful Features...5

- Help:
 - FAQ
 - A-Z searches
 - Indexes
 - Help desks
 - Site maps
 - Searching tips & research assistance
 - Tags
 - Glossary
 - Text versions
 - Directories & user manual

Search Interfaces...1

- Developed by the owners of the collections.
- Bilingual search interface and Site Indexes.
- Referring URLs to commercial vendors: simple web presence for initial introduction only.
- No search options at all: just a long list of what is available.
- Linked with Google for further searching options.
- Collaboration with commercial vendors.
 - what to expect, especially if you already subscribe to their commercial products.

Search Interfaces...2

- Links to additional information resources.
- Preview images.
- Subject, journal title or article browsing.
- Filters and limits to peer review, full texts, content types and dates.
- Search histories.
- Some collections provide link to pay per view options as well, ex. Project EUCLID.
- Possibility to create your own digital library and tagging documents, ex. Gallica.

Problems??...1

- Could be confusing to your patrons when you have access to commercially subscribed collection by the same vendor and both are available through a same search interface, for ex: Blackwell Synergy.
- No translations available for some international collections.
- Image signatures for login or to read PDFs: problematic if in foreign language fonts.
- Web site issues: download times.
- Virus issues and pop blockers.
- Government collections: currency, missing documents, shifting responsibilities and website errors.

Problems??...2

- Beta collections: what happens when they move to pricing models? No answers.
- PDFs: in various language, article by article, full issue of a journal or page by page format.
- Problematic when publisher moves free journals to subscription models, ex: Informaworld.
- Foreign language and translation.
- Download times and http errors.
- Outdated "About" information.
- Special equipment/monitors might be required to read some of the newspapers digitized collections.

Some Statistics

45,000

- Our access is to 87 Collections, providing access to 29,378 free journals/publications.
- You could get access to 82 collections providing access to 24,581 free journals/publication.
- 37598
 Out of 82collections 21 are in foreign languages and have no translations feature in English language.

2419

 This would mean no access to 1832 tittles in English Language.

SSOL User Tips

- Check before you activate. It may mean more expenditures. But if you are classified in their top tier library, then there is no issue.
- Create a "Free Collections" category and include all these collections for easy recognition and management in the data management home.
- Check mark "Omit Proxy from this database button" for proper access.
- Check with SSOL about MARC records.

What do we think?

- We are happy with what we have got for free.
- There is an understanding that these are free collections and may not provide what is expected.
- We have advertised these collections through our web site and newsletter.
