RE: IDS 2930 course description correction needed

With the change in the structure of the General Education program, which removes the language of Part A and Part B from the Humanities section, the course description for IDS 2930 needs to be updated:

This course examines selected problems or issues from multiple perspectives in the Arts and Sciences. Selected topics will range from addressing the great questions of human existence such as good and evil, religion, the meaning of life, and the place of human beings in the universe, to contemporary issues such as climate change, sustainability, cultural pluralism, the use of technology, and terrorism. This course is termed a writing-intensive course and requires a minimum of 4,000 words of instructor-evaluated writing per student, including a minimum of three graded assignments over the duration of the course. If completed with a grade of "C" or better, this course serves to complete part of the writing-intensive course requirements. This course will be taught by two faculty members including at least one faculty member from the Department of Humanities and Fine Arts. **This course counts as a "Humanities Part A" course credit.** (I) Interdisciplinary or Diversity Focus course

The highlighted sentence needs to be removed to reflect the new structure of the general education program. IDS 2930 is now part of the "Additional Humanities General Education Courses".
