This course is for students who have successfully completed CRW 2001 and wish advanced study in the writing of fiction, creative nonfiction, poetry, and/or drama with intensive critical review on a major project, to experience writing for and leading workshops, performing and critiquing readings, as well as comparative study of literature.

- Further development of a literary and practical understanding of the elements of short fiction, creative nonfiction, poetry, or drama.
- Write short fiction, creative nonfiction, poetry, or drama.
- Continue developing critical acumen so as to be able to assist one's peers and oneself in revising original creative work.
- Apply what one has learned through reading, writing, and evaluation to better understand works of established writers.
- Discuss works of established writers.
- Work in workshop format.
- Critically read one's own work.
