**** Simple Syllabus ****

It looks like the committee has been working behind the scenes to approve and set-up Simple Syllabus for a **FULL FALL Roll Out.** Dr. Jester has sent out the links for training, so faculty will know how to use it, **but I don't** yet have the date where the system will be live so you can actually set up your courses. The reality is that I don't think this will be at the School and Department Level to verify the master syllabus information and approve our content before the end of Spring. . .so I estimate it will be June/July before we can start using it in our Fall Canvas shells (hopefully earlier). What does this mean for faculty??

- All courses/sections and faculty will be required to submit Syllabus through Simple Syllabus for FALL of 2023.
- This will not affect summer classes those will be submitted as normal.
- Please do your best to attend the training as soon as you can so you are familiar with the program and the basics of how it will work.
- Once the system is ready to go live, all of the content currently found in the course master syllabus will be pre-populated into all course sections in Simple Syllabus within Canvas.
- Since the system will not likely be ready before faculty depart for summer, I recommend you draft
 your Fall syllabus in Word as normal, and then be prepared to cut and paste the details into the
 system when it becomes available for those not teaching this summer, this will be the week of
 faculty duty days in August.
- For this first go-around, cutting and pasting current syllabus information should be all that is needed to populate the required fields. . . if you want to use all of the new features, please explore!

- Syllabus approval will be done within Simple Syllabus now so you will click a button when ready instead of emailing files to Department Chairs.
- I will publish details of the roll out plan at the 14 April School Meeting (or at least as they are known at that time!)
- I will schedule SoPAS-specific Simple Syllabus Training within the first two days of the Fall duty week to facilitate the transition, and I am sure eLearning will be scheduling lots of walk-in help and training events too!

Summer and Fall Schedules

I have built out most of the summer and fall schedules, and sent out drafts or emails to all, so please help me do a good quality control check on days/times and modalities before the schedule is visible to students. I am still coordinating with our adjuncts to add additional sections to the schedule, and will continue to reach out over the next few weeks.
