



ECHS – Charlotte is very fortunate to be participating in the Race to the Top grant through the Charlotte County Public Schools. By the end of 2011 approximately \$50,000 in funding will have been spent on the following projects: science equipment (microscopes, hot plates, a weather station), textbooks for English and marine science, computers for daily student use, curriculum development and lesson study in all core subjects.

Additionally, the Race to the Top grant has funded the participation of ECHS — Charlotte in iObservation, an observation and evaluation framework that has been adopted by the Florida Department of Education. Principal Diane Juneau, assistant principal Matt Catanzarite, and teachers Mike Mitchell and Jessica Souter have attended three-day workshop sessions on the craft, science, and art of teaching. Throughout this school year the leadership skills gained from these research-based workshops will enable classroom observers to provide relevant feedback about effective teaching practices.

ECHS – Charlotte teachers and administrators will continue to engage in quarterly written reflections on their teaching and their professional development activities. Additionally, beginning with day-long exchange visits with the faculty at ECHS – Lee, ECHS – Charlotte teachers will observe each other in an effort to develop a collaborative culture for teaching. Finally, through the cooperation of Dr. Thomas Rath, ECHS – Charlotte teachers will visit college classrooms and will open their classroom doors for visits by college professors.

In a continuing effort to involve parents in the education of their children, immediately following the posting of interim grades (after the first 4 ½ weeks), guidance counselor Amber Foster arranged for parent/student/faculty conferences for approximately a dozen students having academic difficulties in three or more classes. Following the posting of quarter grades, individual teachers were given the opportunity to invite parents of students struggling in an individual course to an afternoon of one-on-one, subject-specific conferences.

68 juniors, 54 of whom were part of the inaugural class of 2013, are taking dual enrollment courses at the college this semester. 30 of those students are participating in dual enrollment for the first time. The remaining 38 students already have college credit ranging from 3 hours to 26 hours, with the average being 11 hours of college coursework. To date, no ECHS- Charlotte student has earned a college grade below a C.

ECHS – Charlotte juniors Amber Franklin and James Lanza were selected to participate in Junior Leadership Charlotte, a teen leadership program that introduces students to the many service agencies throughout Charlotte County. They follow in the footsteps of math teacher Dawn Nolan who completed the adult Leadership Charlotte program last year.

As STEM education remains a political and educational rallying point for those interested in helping reform education, ECHS – Lee continues to serve as a regional leader. Recognition of this fact came as a feature story in the Gulf Coast Business Review which captured the day-to-day operations and guiding philosophy of the Spartans. During the last month, several local businesses have toured our building, met our students, and indicated their willingness to help students. Large companies like Algenol, Shaw Development, Arthrex Manufacturing, FPL, as well as other businesses like Marine Concepts, SMART companies, the News Press, and ECHO have all stepped up and offered a variety of partnership opportunities. These opportunities include providing quest speakers, tours of their facilities, internships for students, and even some technical engineering support. During October, the STEM team of S.W. Florida and representatives from the STEM focused high schools will also meet here at the school to discuss ways to collaborate and involve students. Much of this outreach effort involves supporting elementary and middle school directed initiatives so that students can begin to realize the benefits of critical thinking and communication early in their academic career.

As a collaborative effort designed to highlight our trademark skills of communication and critical thinking, both sophomores and freshmen completed an interesting activity. Using the commercially available K'NEX (much like LEGOS) building components, student worked together through an engineering based version of the old fashioned telephone game. Freshmen and sophomore students were paired up and then given one of four jobs; designer, communicator, builder, or materials coordinator. The goal was to force creative communication and critical thinking by only allowing the designer access to the given blueprint and limiting them to verbal instructions to the communicator. The communicator then had to create written "work orders" so the materials coordinator could acquire the correct parts for delivery to the builder who ultimately assembled the item. It was compelling to watch the various changes in strategy, frustration levels, and ultimately synergistic teamwork that groups developed. Especially interesting was the specialized vocabulary that groups developed to help move their process along. The de-briefing of how and why information did or didn't move cleanly through the process helped kids understand why and how real world problems are solved.

Our first cohort of eligible dual enrollment students took the PERT test and 31 of 31 students passed two or more sections. This tremendous success is a tribute to the hard work of teachers and students alike and confirms our commitment to having high academic standards for kids. ECHS – Lee sits with each student individually to map out the dual enrollment course of study and will be developing details of our capstone experience class designed to provide students with internship, community service, and other related experiences during their final two years of school.
