



Section III, Justification for proposal

Provide justification (below) for this proposed curriculum action.

Teacher certification in the state of Florida includes a series of licensure exams, known as the Florida Teacher Certification Exams. Students in the B.S., Elementary Education, must pass all licensure exams as a requirement for graduation. The Elementary Education, K-6 Exam includes four subtests covering content and content pedagogy in the areas of language arts and reading; social science; science; and mathematics. The content assessed in each subtest is comprehensive, addressing standards associated with kindergarten through sixth grade. Our current curricular framework in the B.S., Elementary Education program includes courses that integrate two content areas into a single course, often making it difficult to support breadth and depth in the teaching of each critical content area and relevant pedagogy. This proposed program change includes the creation of four new courses, each representing a single content area. Elementary Education programs at other state colleges (Chipola College, Dayton SC, Polk SC, St. Petersburg College, and Northwest Florida SC) include two and as many as four courses dedicated to a single content area to support teacher certification licensure requirements. LAE 3314 is a course that will address the teaching of language arts in the elementary school.





This proposed program change includes the creation of four new courses, each representing a single content area. Elementary Education programs at other state colleges (Chipola College, Dayton SC, Polk SC, St. Petersburg College, and Northwest Florida SC) include two and as many as four courses dedicated to a single content area to support teacher certification licensure requirements. SSE 3313 is a course that will address the teaching of social studies in the elementary school.

Section III, Justification for proposal

Teacher certification in the state of Florida includes a series of licensure exams, known as the Florida Teacher Certification Exams. Students in the B.S., Elementary Education, must pass all licensure exams as a requirement for graduation. The Elementary Education, K-6 Exam includes four subtests covering content and content pedagogy in the areas of language arts and reading; social science; science; and mathematics. The content assessed in each subtest is comprehensive, addressing standards associated with kindergarten through sixth grade. Our current curricular framework in the B.S., Elementary Education program includes courses that integrate two content areas into a single course, often making it difficult to support breadth and depth in the teaching of each critical content area and relevant pedagogy. This proposed program change includes the creation of four new courses, each representing a single content area. Elementary Education programs at other state colleges (Chipola College, Dayton SC, Polk SC, St. Petersburg College, and Northwest Florida SC) include two and as many as four courses dedicated to a single content area to support teacher certification licensure requirements.

 Deletion of EDE 4220 Integrated Health and Recreation (2 credits): Key concepts and relevant learning outcomes will be integrated into other existing courses. For example, school safety will be addressed in EDG 3410 Classroom Management and Communication.

- 2. Deletion of EDF 4782 Ethics and Law (2 credits): Key concepts and relevant learning outcomes will be integrated into other existing courses. For example, EDG 3410 Classroom Management and Communication currently includes a required assignment associated with the Principles of Professional Conduct for the Education Profession in Florida. Two other courses, TSL 4080 Second Language Acquisition and Culture and EEX 3012 Educational Needs of Students with Exceptionalities, introduce students to the Florida Consent Decree and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

The Bachelor of Science (BS) in Elementary Education is designed to prepare individuals to teach all subject areas grades K-6. The program provides an educational pathway for students who have earned an Associate in Arts degree to include EDF 2005. It is also a good option for students with a child development focus. Upon graduation, students will meet the mandated state teaching requirements for certification in Elementary Education with ESOL and Reading Endorsements. Students are strongly encouraged to complete EDF 2085 and EME 2040 as both courses remain Elementary Education program graduation requirements.

Program Highlights:

The BS in Elementary Education is a Florida Department of Education (FLDOE) approved program that culminates with both Reading and ESOL endorsements. The program includes courses in teaching students with English as a second language, students with exceptionalities, reading competency, classroom management, assessment, and integrated approaches to teaching methodologies at the elementary school level. Students will learn to facilitate lessons that integrate math and science, health, music and movement, as well as literature, fine arts, language arts, and social sciences. Field Experience requirements are progressive in nature, building upon previous semester experiences. Students will observe teachers in the field, teach lessons through the practicum courses, and complete a full-time teaching internship in their final semester. Courses are offered for full-time and part-time students, with blended and online courses where applicable.

Admission Requirements:

In addition to fulfilling the entrance requirements for Florida SouthWestern State College, applicants for the BS in Elementary Education degree program must meet the following requirements consistent with Florida Statute 1004.04:

Completion of the Associate in Arts (AA) degree or the equivalent, including all general education and required Florida mandated common course prerequisites. Students with a minimum of 60 transferable hours, with all general education requirements and prerequisites met, may apply for admission.

Completion of EDF 2085 Introduction to Diversity for Educators - (I) with a grade of "C" or better.

Applicants must have an overall grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale or have completed the requirements for a baccalaureate degree with a minimum grade point average of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale from any college or university accredited by a regional accrediting association, as defined by State Board of Education rule, with a minimum of 60 credit hours.

Demonstrated mastery of general knowledge, including the ability to read, write, and compute, by passing the General Knowledge Test of the Florida Teacher Certification Examination.

Applicants not meeting stated admissions criteria may petition for program admittance if they feel that there are mitigating circumstances. Applicants must submit an official petition form to the School of Education (forms are available online at http://www.fsw.edu/soe/forms).

Requirements to Enroll in Upper Division Courses:

Upon admission to the BS program, students must attend a mandatory orientation session prior to enrollment in upper division (3000 and 4000 level) courses.

To participate in the program, students must be fingerprinted and screened by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the FBI prior to entering any school.

Prior to enrollment in any upper division courses, students must complete ENC 1101 - Composition I, ENC 1102 - Composition II and one general education math course.

To be eligible to enroll in EDE 4940 - Internship in Elementary Education, students must have passed all sections of the General Knowledge Test, the Professional Educator's Exam and the Subject Area Exam; and attempted the Professional Educator's Exam and the Subject Area Exam.

Cross-enrollment approval: Baccalaureate degree seeking students must obtain prior approval to cross enroll (as a transient student) in courses intended to fulfill upper division program requirements. Approval will be determined by the appropriate dean in collaboration with program faculty. Students initiate this process using www.floridashines.org/.

Upper Division Transfer Course Review: Students who have completed previous upper division coursework in an Education Program may present those courses for evaluation by the Elementary Education Department Chair. Students may transfer equivalent courses as determined by the State Common Course Numbering System. However, Florida SouthWestern State College reserves the right to

deny common course number credit for courses in which practicum or internship components reside. Florida SouthWestern State College's Office of the Registrar will ensure that previous coursework meets all relevant academic standards before acceptance for transfer. The Dean of the School of Education and the Credit Review Committee will ensure adherence to the above admissions criteria. Students must fulfill all required competencies, standards, skills and dispositions within the Bachelor of Science in Education Programs and may be required to submit additional documentation to support completion requirements. 25% of the 120 credits for the degree must be earned at FSW.

Students who have been fully admitted to the Elementary Education program, but do not enroll in at least one course for three consecutive semesters, are required to apply for readmission to the program. Upon readmission, students are governed by the catalog requirements of the readmission year. Students with special circumstances preventing them from being readmitted to the program may make an appeal to the Dean of the School of Education for their enrollment to be reactivated. Reactivation appeals must include a letter justifying the request, a letter of support from a faculty member, and any and all documentation to support the student's appeal. Reactivated students will be governed by the catalog in place during the year in which they were first admitted to the program.

In addition to adherence to the Florida SouthWestern State College Student Code of Conduct, policies, and procedures, teacher candidates must adhere to disposition policies, unit policies and procedures as published in the School of Education Handbook.

Service Learning Requirement (30 hours)

All Education baccalaureate degrees have a 30-hour service learning requirement. Ten hours will be completed each semester, leading up to final internship. The requirement begins to be met with completion of EDG 4004, and the final culmination and validation of hours will be part of the final internship portfolio for each student.

General Electives (any courses numbered 1000-4999)

Students must complete a minimum of 120 credit hours to earn the B.S. degree. Typically, general electives are fulfilled with lower division coursework taken for completion of the Associate in Arts.

Total Credit Hours: 120

School Based Hour Requirements (720 total hours)

Teacher candidates must submit an application for Practicum I and II as well as for Final Internship to the Field Experience Office. All required benchmarks must be met prior to being approved for Field Experience placements. All practicum courses must span a minimum of ten weeks. During Internship, teacher candidates are expected to attend all duty days and assume all responsibilities as required of the K-12 mentor teacher.

Refer to individual course descriptions for additional information about school based hour requirements.

B.S. in Education Graduation Requirements

Students must earn a cumulative GPA of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale.

Foreign Language Competency Requirement:

2 years of the same High School Foreign Language, or

Documented foreign language proficiency through testing, or

2 semesters of the same College Level Foreign Language (level II proficiency), or

Level II proficiency - this criterion occurs when a student has completed the second course of a sequence of college foreign language without completing the first course. For example, if a student has successfully completed a college-level Spanish II but not Spanish I, then the student has met the Foreign Language Competency requirement.

Students must pass all required sections of the Florida Teachers Certification Examinations (FTCE) for certification within the State of Florida.

While Florida SouthWestern State College governs a student's program requirements, changes to a program emanating from the Florida State Board of Education will take precedence over the College catalog and may alter a student's program of study.

The Florida State Board of Education requires all education students to demonstrate competency in all of the revised Florida Educator Accomplished Practices (FEAPs), Florida Subject Area Competencies (FSAC), and Professional Educator Competencies and Skills (PECS) as a condition of graduation, including completion of a professional portfolio. Elementary and Middle Grades Language Arts students must demonstrate achievement of all State required ESOL Competencies and Performance Standards and Reading competencies as a condition of graduation.

Following graduation, students must apply to the FLDOE for their teaching license.

Students must indicate their intention to attend commencement ceremony, by completing the Commencement Form by the published deadline.

The course will cover major literary movements, history, themes, and cultural productions as they relate to the Black American experience. Upon successful completion of the course, students will understand the evolution of African American literature from the 18th century to the present as well as its significant movements, contexts, concepts, and figures. This course is writing Intensive and counts as a Humanities General Education course.

Section IV, Justification for proposal

In 2019-20 the NUR 4827C course was made co-requisite with NUR 4955 Nursing Capstone course in order to provide a mechanism for students and faculty to assess achievement of end of program student learning outcomes (EPSLO) as required by ACEN (national nursing program accreditation). The leadership course provides students with opportunity to demonstrate achievement of learning outcomes that reflect the practice of the registered nurse at the baccalaureate degree level as a leader in patient care and nursing practice ground in research and evidence. The NUR 4955 capstone course was designed as the assessment of EPSLOs. In implementing the co-requisite courses, there have been issues that have presented barriers to students that hindered the instructional process and the assessment of learning outcomes. With the integration of these two course, students will have a streamlined and more meaningful learning experience from registration for the course to completion of assignments that demonstrate the intended outcomes. Faculty also utilized written and verbal comments from students in the current model to guide this change.

Nursing, AS

Graduates of the Associate in Science in Nursing (ASN) Program are prepared to become licensed as an entry level Registered Nurse (RN). The nursing curriculum incorporates classroom instruction, laboratory, simulation education, and clinical practice in the care of diverse populations. Local health facilities are utilized for clinical practice, including community agencies, acute care institutions, long-term and ambulatory care facilities. Graduates of the program possess knowledge, values, skills, and compassion; all are essential for professional nursing practice in a dynamic and rapidly changing health care environment.

There are two options available in the ASN program, traditional (day hours Monday-Friday on campus classes) and ANEW (Evening and Weekends, online and on campus blended format). The ANEW schedule is not a part-time Nursing program. It will require full-time commitment but it will be offered on a schedule that will consist of online classroom instruction with labs and clinical rotations offered on an evening (Monday-Friday) and weekend schedule.

Admission Requirements:

The ASN Program consists of 72 credit hours. These hours include general education (16 credits) program specific courses (14 credits), and Nursing core courses (42 credits). Competitive applicants will have completed most or all of their general education and program specific courses before starting the Nursing core courses.

Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS)

Nursing Core Courses, are completed in a four (4) semester cohort/group sequence. Students who begin the program in the Fall semester can successfully complete the program in 20 months. Students who begin the program in the Spring semester can successfully complete the program in 24 months.

The Traditional and ANEW schedules for the ASN Program will both require discipline and commitment. Nursing education is rigorous and must be top priority from the first semester through graduation to be successful on the NCLEX-RN licensing exam and to become a professional nurse.

LPN Florida Department of Education Gold Standard and Statewide Articulation Agreements:

This Gold Standard Career Pathways Statewide Articulation Agreement guarantees the minimum award of course credits or a block of credit toward the above AAS/AS program is 10-12 hours of credit. This agreement does not preclude the awarding of additional credits by any college through local agreements. The Licensed Practical Nurse certification, or National Licensed Practical Nurse (NCLEX-PN) certification represents industry acknowledgement of technical skill attainment of competencies in the Nursing (Associate Degree) R.N. program. To be eligible for articulation, the student must show evidence of their current Licensed Practical Nurse certification, or National Licensed Practical Nurse (NCLEX-PN) certification and it must have been issued within three (3) years prior to their enrollment in the program.

FSW LPN Bridge:

In accordance with the Gold Standard and Statewide Articulation Agreement for LPN's, Florida SouthWestern State College offers LPN's, meeting the agreement requirements, the option to accept an ASE1000 block of 10 credits. The ASE1000 block consists of Level I AS Degree Nursing Core Courses: NUR1020, NUR1020L, NUR1025L, and NUR2095.

The ASN Program has limited enrollment due to the rigorous clinical education requirements for the program. Acceptance to Florida SouthWestern State College does not imply acceptance into the program. Each applicant must meet specific criteria which are listed in the admission policies. Phase I: Initial review of applications is based on a calculation of admission points using <u>completed pre-nursing course GPA, TEAS test score</u>, and the total number of general education/program specific courses completed. Pre-admission standardized examination includes the Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS).

Phase II: At the applicant's expense, a college-approved criminal records check and drug testing must be completed. Note that applicants should consult Florida Board of Nursing if they have any criminal offenses, beyond minor traffic violations, which may limit obtaining Registered Nurse (RN) licensure.

Phase III: In this phase, all applicant packets will be reviewed.

Phase IV: Selected applicants will receive a letter of acceptance. The letter will include information for accessing the Nursing Program Policy & Procedures Manual and Virtual Orientation. The student must submit an affidavit of acknowledgment, acceptance and compliance of the Nursing Program Policy & Procedure Manual by the first day of classes.

Note for LPN's: In addition to compliance of contents in Phase IV, selected LPN applicants, accepting the ASE1000 articulation pathway, must satisfactorily complete the LPN Bridge Orientation online by the first day of classes. Access to this orientation will be sent to the applicant with the letter of acceptance.

Academic Policy and Progression Criteria:

The academic standards in the Nursing program are very rigorous and require full-time commitment.

A grade of "C" or better must be earned in General Education (16 credits) and Program Specific (14 credits) courses.

The ASN Program uses the following grading system: (90 - 100 = A, 80 - 89.99 = B, 77 - 79.99 = C, 60 - 76.99 = D, Below 60 = F).

A grade of "C" or better must be earned in each Nursing/NUR course (42 credits) in order to progress in the program.

A grade less than "C" in a Nursing/NUR course will require a reattempt.

A Nursing/NUR course may be repeated or reattempted only once. If a grade of "C" or better is not achieved when the course is repeated or reattempted, dismissal from the program will result.

If a grade of "C" or better is not achieved or Withdrawal/W grade occurs in two or more Nursing/NUR courses, dismissal from the program will result.

Dismissal from the Nursing Program will occur if a student is deemed unsafe or unprofessional in clinical practice/patient care.

The Academic Review Committee (ARC) will evaluate each student who is unsuccessful in a course or has an interruption in their program sequence. An Alternate program plan will be developed by the committee in collaboration with the student

Attendance and punctuality is mandatory for all classroom, laboratory, and clinical activities. The third and each subsequent classroom absence and/or partial absence will result in a 5-point deduction from the final course grade. Attendance (100%) is required for all simulation and clinical activities.

The necessity for this AS degree initially came from the students' desire to take more classes in the digital arts and multimedia production. While the certificate meets the needs of some, it does not meet the needs for all students. The subject matter of this AS is essential to many digital natives. The future of employment is changing drastically and students who want to become digital content producers must have the skills to work across many digital mediums. They must also become creative producers who can adapt to a constantly changing workforce. We want to provide a program that will give students the tools to become "digital Swiss Army knives." The process for developing this program consisted of several meetings between the supporting faculty members: Professor Dana Roes, Dr. Ryan Wurst, and Professor Mike Molloy.

The program needs were based on assessing local and national business needs. Conversations were conducted with local businesses about the needs for more digital content creators. Since this industry is also becoming less localized, conversations were conducted with digital arts consultants in cities across the US. They want the skills to create digital projects and to then make a living from those skills. This program is here to address the needs of the industry and more importantly the students at FSW.

Associate of Science Digital Art and Multimedia Production

Program Description:

The Associate in Science (AS) in Digital Arts and Multimedia Production program provides a pathway to the skills and training for professional work in the expanding digital content creation industry. The sequence of courses prepares students to communicate, produce, and utilize industry standard technical training in the creation of digital and multimedia content.

Students will create, edit, and produce digital content to prepare them for further education and careers in the fields of Games and Interactivity Production, Music Production and Sound Engineering, Digital Photography, Filmmaking, Animation, and Graphic Design. As the creative digital industry is in a state of constant flux students will be introduced to avenues for adapting to and engaging with the ongoing changes in the marketplace. Students will gain experience in many areas of digital art and multimedia production and will be prepared to enter industry or create their own career pathways. This program is designed for full-time and part-time students.

Outcomes:

Graduates of the program will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate a technical and creative understanding of industry hardware and software related to digital art and multimedia production.
- 2. Create and adjust digital art and multimedia presentations in a variety of areas.
- 3. Design and create still imagery through digital photography and graphic creation techniques.
- 4. Produce creative video and animated content.
- 5. Utilize audio technology to aid in the creation of digital art and multimedia.
- 6. Utilize all aspects of computer applications from coding to software manipulation in order to create new projects.
- 7. Demonstrate the skills to communicate and effectively work in a team.
