It seems confusing to a subset of students who refer to it as "Humanities" rather than correctly identifying it as a Social Science course. The title *Lifespan Development* more succinctly reflects the content of the course. *Lifespan Development* is among several titles for DEP 2004 used by Florida colleges and universities. This title fits the FL SCNS description for DEP 2004: *Principles of Development: Psy/Life Span* and poses no difficulties in transferability (FL State info appended).

I ran a course search in SCNS, and found that FL schools use a number of different titles for DEP 2004, including *Lifespan Development*. However, most FL schools use *Human Growth and Development* or *Developmental Psychology*. As you can see below, the point of this course is to cover development across the human lifespan, so we'd like the title to reflect that.

In the past students who were enrolled in the audio technology certificate program were not aware that MUM 2600C can be taken at the same time as MUS 2360 because it is currently listed as a prerequisite only. By changing the requirement to Co-Requisite it will allow an unobstructed pathway for students to enroll in both MUS 2360 and MUM 2600 at the same time without the need of an add form.

Moving forward students will be able to take MUS 2360 Introduction to Technology in Music (3 credits) either as a pre-requisite to MUM 2600C Basic Audio Recording Techniques 1 (3 cr.), as a co-requisite with MUM 2600C, or as a stand-alone elective.

This will assure students will be notified during registration that they can either take MUM2600C after they have completed MUS2360 or at the same time.

Students will read works from various genres which both portray women and are written by women; students will think critically and examine images of women and their roles in society from historical and cross-national perspectives within those works, and students will analyze selected works in women's literature itself to communicate and articulate a better		

understanding of that literary tradition. This course also provides students with a foundation for reading critically through the analysis of and writing about the literature of women as well by researching and organizing critical essays. This is a writing intensive course that requires a minimum of 4,000 words and must be passed with at least a C.

The course number and title for LIT 2201- Special Topics in Literature have been deemed inappropriate by the state, and they have asked us to revise the course to LIT 2930: Special Topics in Literature. This was the initial number for the class before the name and number were changed during the curriculum proposal process (initial proposed number was LIT 2933). This modification was due to feedback that we received on the class during the curriculum approval process.

Once approved, this class will take the place of LIT 2201 at FSW.

Initial explanation for this class is below:

This class will provide added flexibility to professors as they work to meet the needs of FSW students. It is envisioned as a complimentary course to the English Department's other classes, all of which have focused time periods or geographic regions or require a large survey that prevents faculty from exploring a specific genre in depth. The course performs this exact function at Pensacola State College—the institution that first introduced the class in 2009. Its established success there demonstrates its long-term viability. The class will also allow faculty to organically gauge student interest in specific topics and can thus lead to other, topic-specific courses, if demand warrants it.

Most importantly, students have expressed an interest in taking courses beyond our general surveys to give them the knowledge and skills needed to enter and succeed in more focused careers and programs after leaving our institution. This class provides instructors with a tool that they can use to meet this need. The class should also open opportunities for collaboration with other disciplines as well as study abroad courses.
