Project: The Transition to an Innovative, Evidence-Based **Curriculum and Its Effects**



Concept-Based learning has been demonstrated, through evidence-based research, to promote critical thinking and clinical reasoning in students. With this in mind, the Associate in Science Nursing (ASN) program at Florida SouthWestern State College is transitioning from a traditional (or legacy) curriculum to a concept-based curriculum. The first level of the Concept-Based curriculum will be offered beginning in the fall semester of 2016. The teach out process for the traditional program will continue through December 2017.

The intent of this project is to evaluate the impact of a concept-based curriculum on FSW ASN student learning outcomes. Comparison will be made from four student cohorts: two from the traditional curriculum and two from the concept-based curriculum. Evaluating and analyzing similar outcomes between the two curricula will allow our program to determine if revisions are necessary as we implement the new curriculum. A Concept-Based Curriculum in nursing is innovative and not widely used in Florida. This project may also be useful to other nursing programs as they consider a similar change. Evaluation methods include course grade averages, clinical evaluations, simulation surveys, ATI critical thinking exam, ATI comprehensive predictor, on time graduation rate, retention rate, NCLEX pass rate, employer surveys, job placement, and new graduate surveys.

The ARC grant has allowed three faculty members, one from each campus, to attend the Concept-Based Learning Institute in order to gain knowledge of the implementation process of the new curriculum. These faculty members serve as resources to other faculty as the curriculum is implemented and evaluated.
