Project: Bring Library Resources to Life for Students

The libraries at Florida SouthWestern State College purchase databases that hold thousands of peer-reviewed, scholarly journals. The information contained in these journals is not only relevant to research assignments but also to the development of student understanding about information that pertains to their future careers.

For example, nursing students should be encouraged to read specific journals that reflect what is happening within that field. Implementing software that uses an app function, such as Browzine and Flipster, will enable faculty to bring individual journals to the surface for students to engage in a more visually appealing experience.

According to Ferguson (2015), a majority of students use smart phone and apps to access information. Browzine and Flipster will tap into this behavior and create a virtual bookshelf app where students and faculty can pull journal content into. Browzine uses both iOS and Android platforms. Browzine gathers limited statistical data that focuses on hits, not specific patrons, which follows library policy of gathered usage information (Ferguson, 2015).

The library expends about \$8,000 annually on printed trade magazines. Providing these resources to students as print requires students to come to the specific campus library that has purchased that title to use them because these resources are too expensive to offer at all campus libraries.

Offering students a format that they no longer use in their personal lives, such as print, is not engaging to students with these resources. Flipster strives to give the user an aesthetic experience much like a print copy publication. The Flipster app will allow the library to purchase this content in an electronic format and have an access point that today's students connect with. Flipster will also enable these funds to offer these resources district wide to all FSW students.
